





You are going to the Child Assessment Center at The Center for Family Safety and Healing.




You will park in our parking lot behind our building.



You can bring any item that brings you comfort during your visit.



You will enter the Child Assessment Center and check-in with our team.



They will put a bracelet around your wrist.




They will take you to a private room for you and your caregiver.



They will give you a questionnaire to complete.



A nurse will meet with you.



The nurse will get your height, weight, and take your blood pressure.



They will give you a tablet to complete questions about teenagers and behaviors they may participate in.



They will ask you to pee in a cup.



They will take you back to the room with your caregiver.



A social worker will come and take your caregiver to another room to talk.




When the social worker is done talking with your caregiver, it is your turn. They will take you to a room to talk by yourself.




This room is a safe place, and you are in charge of what happens here.



The social worker will get to know you and ask you questions.



You can also ask questions.



When you are done talking, the social worker will take you back to your caregiver.



The nurse will then take you to meet with a doctor for a check-up.



You can decide if you want to meet with the doctor with your caregiver or by yourself.



The doctor will tell you everything they are going to do before they check your body.




This is a safe place, and you are in charge of your body.



You get to decide what parts of your body the doctor can look at during your check-up.



The doctor may decide they need to swab areas of your body to check for germs.



The doctor may decide to have the nurse draw blood to check your body for germs.




You get to decide if these things can occur or not.



When you are all done with your check-up, your caregiver will talk to the social worker.



Depending on the reason for your visit, your caregiver may be asked to talk to either a police officer or someone from child protective services before you leave.
